Who is ASBSD?

Associated School Boards of South Dakota (*ASBSD*) is a private, non-profit organization representing more than 850 local school board members, the 150 (all) public school districts they govern and the students they serve.





What is a School Board?

- Local governing body of the school district.
- Responsibility of public education is shared with the Legislature and local School Boards.
- Power and authority of the collective board comes from the state constitution and laws.





What is a School Board?

- Elected Officials.
- Boards consist of 5, 7, or 9 members.
- Terms are initially 1 to 3 years, and 3 years after that.
- Terms are staggered on the Board.





Who is eligible?

- To be eligible to serve on a South Dakota school board, one must be:
 - At least 18 years old.
 - A resident of the school district.
 - An eligible voter of the school district or representative area.





Who is NOT eligible?

SDCL 13-7-3: No elective county, municipal, or state officer or the holder of any other office, the duties of which are incompatible or inconsistent with the duties of a school board member, shall be eligible for such membership.

You can run, but you cannot serve both.





How do you run?

- Pick up a petition from the business office.
- Follow the instructions EXACTLY.
- Have it signed by 20 qualified voters.
- Return petition to business office before deadline.
- Each local school board sets the date for their election.





2017 Election Dates

- April 11, 2017 election:
 - Petitions not before January 27, 2017
 - Deadline to file, February 24, 2017, 5:00 p.m.
- June 6, 2017 election:
 - Petitions not before March 1, 2017
 - Deadline to file, March 28, 2017, 5:00 p.m.





2017 Election Dates

- June 20, 2017 election:
 - Petitions not before April 11, 2017
 - Deadline to file, May 12, 2016, 5:00 p.m.

• If you MUST mail, use REGISTERED MAIL, not Certified mail.

What does a School Board do?

- Basically three main functions:
 - Hire and evaluate a <u>Superintendent</u>. (CEO)
 - Adopt <u>Policies</u> and make sure they are followed (District laws).
 - Adopt a **Budget** and stay within it.





What does a School Board do?

- Creates a vision for the school district
- Gives guidance & direction to the Superintendent
- Sets goals and monitors progress
- Aligns resources with goals
- Collaborates and communicates with community
- Advocates for public education






What does a School Board do?

- Levy taxes and borrow money.
- Employ necessary personnel.
- Lease real and personal property.
- Carry liability and other insurance.
- Purchase all necessary books and equipment.
- Purchase real property and erect necessary buildings for the operation of the school district
- Develop policies to provide guidance for operation of the school district.
- Ensure the district adheres to state and federal education law.







The unique aspects of school boards

The Board has responsibilities in

each of these areas:

- Legislative
- Executive
- Judicial

What makes a good Board Member?

- Works together with Board members and superintendent as a team.
- Knows only power and authority is at the Board table through **Board action**.
- Follows the *Chain of Command*.
- #1 focus is on student achievement and learning.





Laws you need to know as a school board member

- Open Meeting Law SDCL 1-25-1
- Executive Session Law SDCL 1-25-2
- Pecuniary Interest Law SDCL 6-1-17
- Employment of a Board member by the school district SDCL 13-43-1
- School Board member Code of Ethics (policy)





Open Meeting Law SDCL 1-25-1

"The official meetings of the state, its political subdivisions, and any public body of the state or its political subdivisions are open to the public unless a specific law is cited by the state, the political subdivision, or the public body to close the official meeting to the public."





Executive Session Law SDCL 1-25-2

- Discussing the qualifications, competence, performance, character or fitness of any public officer or employee or prospective public officer or employee. The term "employee" does not include any independent contractor;
- 2. Discussing the expulsion, suspension, discipline, assignment of the educational program of a student.
- Consulting with legal counsel or reviewing communication from legal counsel about proposed or pending litigation or contractual matters.
- 4. Preparing for contract negotiations or negotiating with employees or employee representatives.
- 5. Discussing marketing or pricing strategies.





Pecuniary Interest Law SDCL 6-1-17

"Official prohibited from discussing or voting on issue if conflict of interest exists."

- (1) "Direct pecuniary interests,"
- (2) "Indirect pecuniary interests,"
- (3) "Direct personal interest,"
- (4) "Indirect personal Interest,"





Employment of school board member SDCL 13-43-1

"Employment of school board member in same district prohibited. No person employed to teach or to draw public money as a teacher may serve as a board member in the same school district."





School Board member Code of Ethics

- . . . leave the daily administration of schools to the Superintendent;
- . . . the authority vests with the majority of the members of the governing board when assembled in meetings as authorized by law,
- . . . distinguish between personal views and those of the school board when making public comments regarding school district matters;
